Fight for Leaders Worth Following

People are quick to equate good leadership with position and power. But in Jesus' leadership model, those things are secondary.

Scripture:

He must manage his own family well, having children who respect and obey him. For if a man cannot manage his own household, how can he take care of God's church? 1st Timothy 3:4-5

So a church leader must be a man whose life is above reproach. He must be faithful to his wife.[a] He must exercise self-control, live wisely, and have a good reputation. He must enjoy having guests in his home, and he must be able to teach.3 He must not be a heavy drinker[b] or be violent. He must be gentle, not quarrelsome, and not love money.

1st Timothy 3:2-3

Icebreaker and Intro Questions:

- 1. Would you consider yourself a leader? Why or why not? (There's no wrong answer here)
- 2. What resonated with you from Sunday's service? (Sermon, scripture, song, etc.)

Discussion Questions

- 3. Read 1st Timothy 3:4-5 together as a group. Eddie shared that the first thing a leader is to do is to succeed at home first. Why is this so vital to the life of a leader?
- 4. Read 1st Timothy 3:2-3 together as a group. Eddie shared that the second thing a leader is to do is live a life worth living. What is Paul encouraging Timothy to do with these verses?
- 5. Eddie concluded with this final point, "leaders resist the urge to serve ourselves." How can this be tempting and damage leaders?
